## 1. Council Regulation (EC) No 2200/96 Fresh fruit and vegetables

- Products covered
- Marketing standards & conformity checks
- Producer organisations (POs) and groups (PGs)
  - Recognition of POs/PGs
  - Aid to POs and PGs
- Interbranch organisations
- Withdrawals (intervention)
- Trade with third countries



### Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.1(1) Marketing standards and conformity checks

#### Marketing standards

- Goals (Whereas (3) of 2200/96)
  - Facilitate trade relations based on fair competition
  - Keeping unsatisfactory products off the market
  - Guiding producers to meet consumer expectations
  - Improve the profitability of production
- Products to be delivered fresh to the consumer may be classified by reference to a set of standards.
- Account shall be taken of the standards adopted by the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UN/ECE).



### Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.1(2) Marketing standards and conformity checks

- Standards applicable at every marketing stage: dispatch, wholesale, retail, import, export
  - Exceptions
    - Products before they reached packaging/preparation plant within the production area
    - Direct sales from the producer to the final consumer
    - Products for processing
- Holder responsible, not owner

### Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.1(6) Marketing standards and conformity checks

- Basic rules: (EC) No 2200/96 Articles 7 to 10
- Detailed rules: Commission Regulation (EC) No 1148/2001
- sampling at all marketing stages and during transport by the authorities appointed by each Member State.
- checks preferably made prior to dispatch from production areas when the products are being packed or loaded.
- accepted for importation from third countries only if they conform to the marketing standards
- Products for export to third countries shall be subject to a check for compliance with the standards before they leave the customs territory of the Community.
- Possibility of approval of the official inspection authorities of the exporting third country.

### Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.2(1) Producer organisations and groups

#### Council Regulation (EC) No 2200/96

- Commission Regulation (EC) No 1432/2003 Recognition of producer organisations and producer groups
- Commission Regulation (EC) No 1433/2003
   Aid to producer organisations:
   Operational programme, operational fund
- Commission Regulation (EC) No 1943/2003 Aid to producer groups



### Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.2(2) Producer organisations and groups

- Producer organisations Whereas (7) and Article 11 of (EC) No 2200/96; (EC) No 1432/2003
  - Basic element of the CMO
  - Counterweight to the growing concentration of demand
  - Voluntarily formed (and owned) by growers
  - Adjustment of production to demand
  - Concentration of supply (joint sales of the members' products)
  - Reduction of production costs, producer price stabilisation
  - Protection of the environment
  - POs possess the infrastructure to carry out these tasks
  - POs fulfil certain requirements (min. 5 members, min. 100 000 €/year, staff etc.)



### Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.2(3) Producer organisations and groups

#### ❖ Aid to POs – (EC) No 1433/2003

- Based 3-5 years long <u>operational programmes</u> ("business plans") with development measures relating to
  - Production planning
  - Concentration of supply
  - Production cost reduction, producer price stabilisation
  - Protection of the environment (e.g. organic and integrated production)
  - Improvement of product quality and/or value
- Channelled through the <u>operational fund</u> (OF)
- Members pay 4.1% of the value of marketed production (VMP) to the OF; the EU pays the same amount, no upper limit



### Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.2(4) Producer organisations and groups

- Producer groups (EC) No 2200/96, Article 14;
   (EC) No 1432/2003
  - Entities that cannot yet be recognised as a PO (due to a low number of members/turnover, lack of infrastructure...) can have a maximum 5 year transitional period to reach that level
  - Before recognition they shall present a recognition plan with the measures to be implemented to achieve recognition



### Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.2(5) Producer organisations and groups

- ❖ Aid to producer groups (EC) No 1943/2003
  - Aid (co-financed by the Member State) may be granted
    - Flat-rate aid for setting up and running the PG
      - Degressive over time: 5-5-4-3-2% of the VMP over the 5 years, up to 1 000 000 € VMP
      - Degressive over value: 2.5-2.5-2.0-1.5-1.5% of the VMP for the part above 1 000 000 €
      - Limited: max. 100 000 100 000 80 000 60 000 –
         50 000 € over the five years
    - Special loans to finance investments linked to the implementation of the recognition plan



## Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.3. Interbranch organisations

- (EC) No 2200/96, Articles 19 to 22
- Made up of representatives of activities linked to production and/or trade and/or processing
- Activities (whole list in Article 19(1)(c) of 2200/96)
  - Improving market knowledge and transparency
  - Standard contracts
  - Research
  - **\*** [...]
- May make certain rules and financial contribution compulsory for non-members



## Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.4. Withdrawals

- (EC) No 2200/96 Whereas (16) to (18), Articles 23 to 30;
   (EC) No 103/2004
- Main goal: stabilise prices by not putting up for sale certain quantities at certain periods
- Decision on withdrawal made by POs; individual growers have access to the system through POs
- Community withdrawal compensation for certain products (2200/96 Annex II) to cover production costs, paid for max. 5%, 8.5% or 10% of the quantity marketed by the PO
- Withdrawn products must comply with marketing standards
- Use of withdrawn products: charity, animal feed, distillation, composting



# Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.5(1) Trade with third countries

#### Import

- Application of the common custom tariff
- Preferential agreements with certain third countries: tariff reductions without limits or within tariff quotas

# Fresh fruit and vegetables 1.5(2) Trade with third countries

#### Export

- Export refunds (EC) No 1961/2001 (actual rates published regularly in further regulations)
  - WTO-bound maximum quantities and amounts
  - Products concerned
    - Tomatoes
    - Shelled almonds
    - Hazelnuts
    - walnuts in shell
    - Apples
    - Peaches
    - Certain citrus fruit



## 2. Council Regulation (EC) No 2201/96 Products processed from fruit and vegetables

- Products covered
- Aid system
- Trade with third countries



### Products processed from fruit and vegetables 2.1(1) Aid system

- **⋄** For tomatoes, peaches and pears (EC) No 1535/2003
  - For the production of certain processed products (Annex I)
  - Based on contracts between POs and processors
  - Individual growers can also participate, but only through POs
  - Aid paid to the POs

❖ Tomatoes
34.50 €/ton

❖ Peaches 47.70 €/ton

❖ Williams and Rocha pears 161.70 €/ton

- Processing thresholds per Member State and product (Annex II): if overrun, aid reduced next year
- Minimum requirements for raw materials and finished products: (EEC) No 1764/86, 2319/89, 2320/89, (EC) No 1010/2001



### Products processed from fruit and vegetables 2.1(2) Aid system

- Production aid for dried figs and d'Ente prunes (EC) No 1535/2003, (EC) No 464/1999
  - Paid to processors that paid not less than the minimum price (fixed before each marketing year)
  - Aid per net weight of the processed product
    - (in marketing year 2004/2005 for dried figs: 139.77 €/net ton)
    - (in marketing year 2004/2005 for d'Ente prunes: 923.17 €/net ton)
  - Based on contracts between POs and processors
  - Individual growers can also participate, but only through POs
  - Minimum requirements for finished products: (EC) No 1573/1999 (also (EC) No 464/1999)



### Products processed from fruit and vegetables 2.1(3) Aid system

#### ❖ Aid for grapes – (EC) No 1621/1999

- For grapes intended for the production of dried grapes: sultanas, Muscatel, currants
- Aid per hectare on the basis of the average yield, for a maximum guaranteed Community area (aid reduced if exceeded)
- Paid to processors that paid not less than the minimum price (fixed before each marketing year)
- Based on contracts between POs/individual producers and processors
- Minimum requirements for finished products: (EC) No 1666/1999
- Replanting aid to combat phylloxera



### Products processed from fruit and vegetables 2.2. Buying-in

- Buying-in of sultanas, currants and dried figs (EC) No 1622/1999
  - Carried out by storage agencies
  - Maximum quantity, buying-in price
  - Storage aid paid to the storage agencies
  - Bought-in products sold by tender or at a price fixed in advance



### Products processed from fruit and vegetables 2.3(1) Trade with third countries

#### Import

- Application of the common custom tariff
- Preferential agreements with certain third countries: tariff reductions without limits or within tariff quotas

### Products processed from fruit and vegetables 2.3(2) Trade with third countries

#### Export

- Export refunds (EC) No 1429/95 (actual rates published regularly in further regulations)
  - WTO-bound maximum quantities and amounts
  - Products concerned
    - Dried grapes
    - Provisionally preserved cherries
    - Tomato concentrate
    - Fruit preserved by sugar
    - Nuts
    - Orange juice



## 3. Council Regulation (EC) No 2202/96 Aid scheme for certain citrus fruit

- Products covered
- Aid system
- Detailed rules (EC) No 2111/2003



## Aid scheme for certain citrus fruit 3.1. Products

#### Products covered

- Lemons, grapefruit, oranges, mandarins and clementines processed into juice
- Clementines and satsumas processed into segments



## Aid scheme for certain citrus fruit 3.2. Aid system

- Based on contracts between POs and processors
- Individual growers can also participate, but only through POs
- ❖ Aid (2202/96, Annex I) paid to the POs
  - ❖ Between 81.90 €/ton and 112.70 €/ton, depending on the product and the type of contract
- Processing thresholds per Member State and product (2202/96, Annex II): if overrun, aid reduced next year
- Minimum quality requirements for raw materials

  - Sweetened chestnut purée
- Authorised ingredients
- Definitions and treatment of raw materials
- Special labelling requirements (complementing **Directive** 2000/13/EC)
