
- Export oriented production started in Antalya, 1985



> the total ornamental plant production area 3,930 ha

- 2,820 ha of ornamental plant production in fields
- 1,025 ha in plastic greenhouses
 - 85 ha in glass greenhouses
- > 503 ha of which in Antalya
- >cut flowers production area: 1,200 ha
 - 364 ha in open air
 - 772 ha in plastic greenhouse
 - 64 ha in glass greenhouse

- The cut flower sector \$\Rightarrow\$ the most well organized group in the agricultural sector still;

Domestic marketing channels:

- 1. Producers cooperative auctions flower shops and vendors (90% of the flowers from cooperative auctions)
- 2. Producers wholesalers flower shops
- 3. Producers wholesalers supermarkets
- 4. Producers directly to the flower shops and vendors

Demand for exports
Role of exporter's unions

Export Companies by contractual production system
Products collected and exported by wholesaler
Companies making their own production and export

Preferential Trade

EU COUNTRIES

Turkey has ad valorem duty exemption for exports

Turkey has duty free import tariff quotas for bulbs and tubers (200 tons), live plants under CN 0602.90 (3,400 tons), cut flowers (100 tons) and foliage and branches (100 tons)





CANDIDATE COUNTRIES

- Under FTA with Bulgaria, Turkey has 50 tons export tariff quota for cut flowers with 28% duty
- Turkey also has duty free import tariff quotas for bulbs and tubers as well as live plants including roses
- Under FTA with Romania, Turkey has 75 tons duty free import tariff quota for bulbs and tubers; for live plants Turkey has reduced duty for 50 tons





THIRD COUNTRIES

- Under FTA with Morocco, Turkey has 20 tons export tariff quota for bulbs with 10% duty as well as 50 tons import quota for live plants and 5 tons import quota for orchids
- Under FTA with EFTA, Turkey has unlimited duty free access for cut flowers to Norway and for roses and carnations to Switzerland
- Under Turkey- Bosnia and Herzegovina FTA, all floriculture products are reciprocally subject to a concession of 0% duty on unlimited basis



COMPARISON OF EU – TURKISH LEGISLATION

77/144/EEC: Commission Decision "Laying down the standard code and rules governing the transcription into a machine-readable form of the data of the surveys of plantations of certain species of fruit trees, and laying down the boundaries of the production areas for these surveys"



" Agricultural Quarantine Law" the Directive for Granting Reports, Licenses & Other Precautions after the Control & Examinations made to Nurseries, Ornamental Plant & Flower Bulbs Production Areas.
